

DOCTORATE IN EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP (ED.D.)

The Ed.D. Program consists of 54 units of coursework and 6 units of dissertation research. Coursework can be completed in three years. Classes are offered on alternate weekends throughout the year. The program is organized in a cohort structure that leverages group support for progress toward program completion.

Admissions

Application materials for the Ed.D. Program should be received prior to April 30th for admittance to the cohort beginning in June of the same year. (For further information, visit our website at: www.stmarys-ca.edu/soe or contact the Program Assistant at: 925.631.4690)

Admissions requirements include:

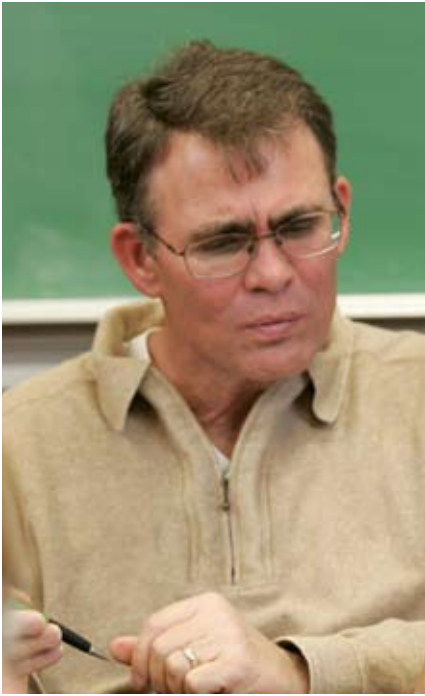
- A Master's degree from an accredited institution
- A graduate grade point average of 3.5 or better (or evidence of comparable academic achievement or potential)

- Two official transcripts of any prior academic work.
- A resume or Curriculum Vitae.
- Three letters of recommendation from supervisors or other persons familiar with the applicant's professional work and potential for advanced study.
- A formal interview.
- An on-site writing sample.
- Official test scores: Minimum score of 1000 on the GRE (combined Verbal and Quantitative) **or** a minimum score of 50 on the MAT **or** a minimum score of 55, with an overall total of 550 on the TOEFL.

Financial Aid & Scholarships

The Financial Aid process begins by filing a free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online at: www.fafsa.ed.gov (Saint Mary's College Title IV code is: #001302). Prospective students should also complete a Saint Mary's Financial Aid application, available on Saint Mary's website. Twice a year, in the fall and spring, all Kalmanovitz School of Education students have the opportunity to apply for scholarships distributed by the school. Students are encouraged to research and apply for other scholarships that may be available through outside organizations or entities.
