On-Campus Support and Resources

CARE (Campus Assault Response and Education) Center

(925) 631-4193

The Director of the CARE Center is a confidential resource, advocate, and support person. Students can seek assistance, resources, and information from the Director without initiating the reporting process.

CARE (Campus Assault Response and Education) Line

(925) 878-9207

During the academic year, students can call or text the line anonymously 24 hours a day for resources, support, to learn their options for accessing medical and emotional care, and to receive critical, time-sensitive information about how to report their case on and off campus.

Counseling and Psychological Services

(925) 631-4364

Licensed therapists are available in a safe and confidential environment to help students who experience a wide variety of personal, academic, and relationship concerns. Counselors with expertise in sexual assault are available. Students can access both individual counseling and a sexual trauma survivor's group.

Center for Women and Gender Equity

The CWGE is an inclusive space where every member of our community can seek education, support, dialogue, and engagement around issues of gender equity, identity, and equality.

Mission and Ministry Center

Pastoral support and counseling is available. Priests are able to maintain confidentiality, in the context, and under the protection, of the priest-penitent privilege. Other staff members are not able to maintain confidentiality.

Reporting and Disciplinary Resources

Dean of Students Office/Office of Community Life

Available for consultation and assistance with the pursuit of possible disciplinary actions. Consulting with this office will not require you to file a report. Students may be accompanied by an advocate or advisor.

Public Safety

24/7 security, safety, crime prevention, and emergency services at SMC. Officers are trained to respond appropriately to survivors of sexual assault. Reports can be made by phone or in person at any time.

Title IX Coordinator and Deputy Coordinators (925) 631-4212

These individuals provide support and information regarding options, including: grievance procedures, interim remedies, and ongoing emotional support to students, staff, and faculty. They will assist in eliminating the misconduct, preventing its occurrence, and addressing its effects.

Moraga Police Department

24/7 law enforcement agency with jurisdiction on campus. Officers can come onto campus to take a report and can assist with getting medical attention for a survivor. Law enforcement is responsible for setting up a forensic medical exam.

Physical Health and Evidence Collection

Health and Wellness Center

Clinicians provide basic medical and urgent care for minor injuries. For serious injuries, students are assessed and then referred to hospitals and physicians in the community. STI tests are provided.

Note: Under certain circumstances, health care professionals are required by law to report to the police injuries that appear to have been suffered through assaultive or abusive conduct.

Contra Costa Regional Medical Center

Forensic medical exams are performed by specially trained nurses who collect evidence, treat injuries, and provide prophylactic treatment for STIs and pregnancy. Law enforcement should be contacted before going to the hospital for the exam.

Frequently Asked Questions

How do I change rooms or residence halls?

Contact the staff at the CARE Center (925-631-4193) or Dean of Students Office/Community Life (925-631-4238), who will work to arrange any residence hall/room changes.

How do I change classes and get academic support?

Contact the Director of the CARE Center (925-631 - 4193), who can provide initial assistance with courses (e.g., extensions, switching classes). The Assistant Vice Provost of Student Success will assist with any courses and communications with professors, but please note that recommendations about courses are at the sole discretion of the professors.

How do I deal with being in public campus spaces such as the library or the dining hall?

Contact the staff at the CARE Center (925-631-4193) or Dean of Students Office/Community Life (925-631-4238), who will provide support, guidance, and advocacy.

How do I change my work situation? (for staff or faculty members)

Contact Human Resources (925-631-4212) who provides support for staff and faculty members by identifying, communicating, and resolving human resources issues.
