SAINT JOHN BAPTIST DE LA SALLE

Founder, Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools • Patron Saint of Teachers

In 1680, De La Salle received his doctorate in theology and began to follow a vocation that responded to the educational needs of the poor, led to innovations in teaching, committed to solidarity with those with whom he and the Christian Brothers served, and was the foundation of the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools.



De La Salle wrote numerous texts on matters of spirituality, education, and teacher training: including, *Meditations for the Time of Retreat*, *The Conduct of Schools*, *The Rules of Christian Decorum and Civility*, and *Methods of Interior Prayer*.
