ES 1-1, ES 1-2 Introduction to Ethnic Studies, David Quijada MWF 9:15-10:20am and 10:30 -11:35am
This introductory Ethnic Studies class draws upon interdisciplinary approaches to understand and problematize the study of race and ethnicity in the United States. The class will discuss current disciplinary debates, theoretical frameworks and methodological approaches within the diverse field of Ethnic Studies. By focusing upon diverse populations in the United States the class will index a broad range of cultural and political contexts; social problems; and histories to comprehend how racial formations and ethnic identity constructions have contradictorily served to: (1) create inequality and sustain systems of power and privilege and (2) create fissures of possibility to forge self-reflective solidarities and intercultural alliances that serve to dismantle oppressive conditions. The class will discuss the social construction of race and ethnicity coupled with the intersectionality of identity and positionality across race, class, gender and sexuality.

ES 100 Selected Topics in Ethnic Studies, Staff TTH 8:00-9:15am

ES 110-1, Youth Cultures, David Quijada, MWF 11:45 - 12:50pm
This class explores youth experiences with culture and identity across race, class, gender, and sexuality. In addition to understanding the social, cultural, and historical conditions that position young people as deviant, over-sexed, apathetic and resistant, this class discusses how youth create culture that contributes to theirs and others socialization in society. In this capacity, the class discusses how youth (past and present) produce knowledge that informs what is popular culture, citizenship, art, politics and identity while resisting mainstream representations that have constructed them as other (i.e., gang member, teen mother, drug dealer, etc). Students will develop skills to interrogate and map "identity," that has been constructed for and by "youth" across local and global contexts, socializing discourses and within community and familial institutional settings.
