

Appendix C: Constitution Requirement

How do you know if you have fulfilled it?

There nine easy ways and one slightly more difficult way to fulfill the Constitution requirement:

- 1) You graduated from the TtT program at Saint Mary's.
- 2) You graduated from SMC in another program and took History 17 or HIST 18, for example. There are other classes, I am sure, so just email me with the course you took.
- 3) You graduated from a Cal State school. Any CSU. Seriously.
- 4) You did your GE's at a community college. Somewhere in there, you likely took HIST 7A/B, GOVT 1, POLISCI 10 or something similar. This isn't a guarantee, but it has a REALLY good chance of fulfilling the requirement.
- 5) You went to any institution and you majored in US History, US Government or Political Science.
- 6) You went to law school. Con Law = done!
- 7) You passed the AP US History exam and it shows up on your undergrad transcript.
- 8) You took a class on the history of a particular under-represented group in the U.S. So, for example, "History of African Americans in America" fulfills the requirement.
- 9) You know you took only, for example, Art classes and so you take the Constitution test at NDNU. (Please see the handbook.) This test has a very high passing rate if you pay attention to the practice booklet NDNU sends you.

Harder way:

You took this one class, and the name of it has nothing to do with US History or government, but you know that you talked all about the Constitution. Then you'll need to get the course description and maybe even the syllabus to show me that the majority of the content was about the Constitution.
